First Camping Trip Suggested Gear List

Once you gather your clothing and gear: PUT YOUR NAME OR INTIALS ON $\underline{EVERYTHING}$

Clothing
Class A uniform (wear to/from ALL camping trips)
■ Class A shirt
 Troop neckerchief
■ Troop ball cap
■ Scout pants
Raingear (separate top and pants)
Long pants
Long sleeve shirt
Underwear Underwear
Footwear
Plastic bags as shoe liners (considering that it may rain)
Liner socks (thin, synthetic) 3 pair
Outer socks (thick for insulating) 3 pair
Long underwear (synthetic)
Sleepwear
☐ Wool or synthetic stocking cap
Sweater/sweat shirt (preferably synthetic)
☐ Coat
Gloves (including a pair of leather work gloves for both summer and winter trips)
Equipment
Scout Handbook
☐ Sleeping bag
☐ Sleeping pad
1 qt or 1 liter water bottle (NOT metal)
Cup (indestructible)
A single bowl (indestructible) for meals ("mess kits" are more trouble than they are worth and are soon abandoned for a simpler, single bowl)
A single spoon or spork

☐ Small flashlight (headlamps are popular for "hands free" operation)
☐ NEW batteries
4 pieces of 1/8 inch nylon cord (parachute), each ten feet in length
Compass (ex., Suunto M-3 Field Compass) on a lanyard
Whistle on a lanyard
Personal first aid kit (see Troop website Documents / Camping Hiking Checklists)
Personal hygiene items
1/2 roll of toilet paper in plastic bag
☐ Small bottle of hand sanitizer
Pen/pencil
☐ Small notebook
Duct tape (about five feet, wrapped around a short pencil)

Pocket Knife: Not necessary for this trip, but should you desire to equip your Scout with a knife a good example is the Swiss Army Tinker Pocket Knife (\$20.00). This knife has all the "blades" one will ever need on a camping trip and a lanyard ring. Should your Scout bring a pocket knife on this camping trip, the knife will be held by Troop leadership until your Scout earns his Totin Chit.

All gear should be packed into a single "container". A duffle-type bag is sufficient, but avoid anything with hard, inflexible sides, such as a suitcase.
